ABOUT NMMU

Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University (NMMU) is a new generation university, distinguished by a wide range of study options and access routes open to students. With 450 programmes from certificate through to doctoral level across 130 different career fields, NMMU truly is a comprehensive university.

Founded on more than a century of quality higher education, NMMU nurtures innovation, fosters creativity, embraces technology and develops people to meet the challenges of tomorrow. NMMU is a product of a merger of the University of Port Elizabeth and the PE Technikon in 2005. Prior to such a merger, the Vista University campus of Port Elizabeth was incorporated into the former University of Port Elizabeth.

The university has a strong track record of research, working extensively in partnership with business and industry, making NMMU a valued contributor to the socioeconomic development of the region and beyond.

This year (2017), the university has 24530 students and close to 4100 permanent and contract staff, based on seven campuses in Nelson Mandela Bay and George.

Facilities and supportive teaching and learning environment

NMMU is privileged to have outstanding facilities. All students have access to well-equipped laboratories, some of which are open 24/7, and free Wi-Fi throughout all its campuses. All the lecture halls are equipped with the latest technology and students have the opportunity of using additional e-learning tools online. The campus libraries and information services network offers a state-of-the-art integrated online system. There are cafeterias, food courts and coffee shops.

A range of opportunities are provided to enhance the academic success of students. These include a first-year orientation programme, peer-facilitated learning opportunities (eg, Supplemental Instruction, e-PAL, tutorials, practicals, mentor programmes, 'Keys to Success' workshops and online resources). NMMU also promotes both in and outside of the class learning to enhance holistic student development. To recognise the learning that takes place outside of the class, NMMU has developed an innovative, electronic co-curricular record system.

The University also offers the finest sporting facilities in the Eastern Cape and numerous venues for conferences, meetings and other special events.

Research and Engagement entities

NMMU has 31 focused faculty based and 7 institution-wide entities (institutes, centres and units) that exist over and above the formal academic structures that are aimed at promoting engagement, research, technology transfer and innovation. They include the likes of InnoVenton; NMMU's Institute for Chemical Technology and Downstream Chemicals; eNtsa, an institute that focuses on seeking solutions through engineering; Earth Stewardship Science Research Institute (ESSRI); and Institute for Coastal and Marine Research. Many are award-winning entities.

'Green' endeavours

In line with its value of respect for the natural environment, NMMU is involved in a large number of "green" initiatives that will not only reduce its own carbon footprint but is also assisting others in seeking renewable energy resource solutions. The university's new Business School, for example, was the first in the country to be awarded four-star "green" accreditation for a public and education building by the Green Building Council of South Africa in 2013. The "green" agenda is supported by the Centre for Renewable Energy, which is recognised as a research leader in the field.

International links

Just over 8% of NMMU's student body comes from 64 different countries outside of South Africa. The Office for International Education fosters relationships and manages inter-institutional linkages to enrich both NMMU staff and students. These partnerships also foster our growing research. NMMU regularly sends students for study abroad opportunities.

Reasons to be proud:

- NMMU's diversity and multiculturalism. Our African students alone come from 34 countries on the continent.
- The High Resolution Transmission Electron Microscopy (HRTEM) Centre, which opened in 2011, is the only place in Africa where scientists can view atoms in line with NMMU's growing prominence for nanoscience.
- More than 40% of NMMU academic staff have doctoral degrees when compared to the national average of 33%.
- New infrastructure like the iconic Engineering block on North Campus and the new Human Movement Science Building complete with a 100m research sprint track on South Campus.
- NMMU has excellent links with industry and business, particularly within the pharmacy, tourism and automotive industries.
- NMMU's ongoing education partnership with Fifa, as one of only two presenters in Africa of an international sports management programme through the Centre International d'Etude du Sport (CIES).
- The success of being the first student racing team from Africa to successfully compete in the Formula Student event in Germany. NMMU students designed and built a racing car to exacting specifications.
- The university was selected in 2012 to facilitate the country's first electric e-mobility programme and technical centre, called the uYilo e-mobility programme.
- NMMU has extensive expertise within the field of friction processing which has resulted in numerous national awards for the patented technology, WeldCore[®]. This technology has also aligned the strategic partnership between NMMU and Eskom.
- NMMU's accounting and pharmacy students who continue to produce top results in their national external
 examinations
- NMMU's international award-winning choir which continues to perform around the globe to wide acclaim.

Special academic attire was designed for office bearers at Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University to be worn at prestigious academic events like graduation.

around the cowl with 75mm faculty colour ribbon with 15mm blue ribbon overlaid central. 50mm wide straight neckband in cardinal red polyester cashmere, 25mm faculty colour ribbon in centre

of neckband with 15mm blue ribbon overlaid central to faculty ribbon.

Cap: Round doctor's bonnet in black velvet with faculty colour cord and tassel.

Master's degrees

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail is used.

Hood: Full shape blue hood lined faculty colour satin and edged around the outside of the cowl with

75mm faculty colour with ribbon. 50mm straight neckband in blue with 25mm faculty colour ribbon

centred.

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

Postgraduate diplomas

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail.

Hood: Blue simple shape hood lined silver grey satin. Straight neckband with 15mm faculty ribbon on

top edge of neckband and around cowl. 15mm silver grey ribbon on bottom edge of neckband

and around cowl spaced 20mm away from the faculty colour.

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

Bachelor honours degrees

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail.

Hood: Blue simple shape hood lined silver grey satin with 50mm wide straight neckband in faculty colour.

Cowl edged 75mm faculty colour ribbon on the outside. 15mm silver grey ribbon runs along the

outer edge of the cowl, overlaid on faculty ribbon and on top edge of neckband.

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

Four-year bachelor's degrees (including Bachelor of Technology degrees)

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail.

Hood: Blue simple shape hood lined silver grey satin with 50mm wide straight neckband in faculty colour.

Cowl edged 75mm faculty colour ribbon on the outside. Silver grey cord runs along the outer

edge of the cowl, overlaid on faculty ribbon and on top edge of neckband.

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

Three-year bachelor's degrees

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail.

Hood: Blue simple shape hood lined with silver grey satin with 50mm wide straight neckband in faculty

colour. Cowl edged 75mm faculty colour ribbon on the outside.

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

Advanced diploma

Gown: Black gown, long pointed sleeves pleated up with blue twisted double cord and button. Similar

cord detail.

Hood: Blue simple shape hood lined with silver grey satin with 50mm wide straight neckband. 15mm

Cap: Black mortarboard with blue tassel.

EVALUATING NEUROPSYCHIATRIC SYMPTOMOLOGY IN HIV-POSITIVE PATIENTS ON EFAVIRENZ IN PUBLIC-SECTOR CLINICS AND PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITALS

The antiretroviral Efavirenz is associated with neuropsychiatric side effects, which are generally mild and self-limiting in nature. However, clinicians avoid prescribing Efavirenz to mental-health users, despite Efavirenz having a more favourable side-effect profile and a lower propensity for interactions with psychiatric medication, as opposed to the other anti-retrovirals. The aim of the study was to determine the incidence of neuropsychiatric side effects; and to determine whether Efavirenz could be used by mental-health users, as well as the attitude of prescribers towards the use of Efavirenz.

The study found that patients were not appropriately screened for mental illness at the primary-healthcare level; and it highlighted that mental-health services must be further integrated into HIV programmes at primary healthcare level. Patients admitted to psychiatric hospitals on Efavirenz experienced stabilisation of psychiatric symptoms; and they were appropriately managed on psychiatric medication – and subsequently discharged from the facilities to a greater extent – than those patients on non-Efavirenz regimens.

Healthcare practitioners at primary healthcare and institutional level were unclear as to the side effects of Efavirenz; and there were conflicting opinions on whether or not Efavirenz should be used for the treatment of mental health conditions. The continuing education of healthcare professionals is important, in order to ensure proper patient care. Further studies focusing on Efavirenz for mental-health users would allow policy-makers to clarify the place of Efavirenz in HIV therapy; since it is likely to continue to be the mainstay of treatment, as part of the fixed-dose combination tablet.

THE INFLUENCE OF CORPORATISATION ON THE PROFESSIONAL IDENTITY OF COMMUNITY PHARMACISTS

This study explored the impact of recent legislative changes in the pharmacy-practice environment, specifically corporatisation; since this affects the professional identities of community pharmacists. Given that the pharmacy profession is facing another phase of potential change, with the implementation of the National Health Insurance (NHI), a clear understanding of the impact of legislative changes on pharmacists' views of themselves, as skilled professionals, is highly relevant.

Although five core-professional identities, common to both corporate and independent community pharmacists, have been identified, proof of the distinct divide between pharmacists in these sectors was provided in the identification of a further four contrasting identities. In short, this study determined that corporatisation has led to a loss of professional autonomy; and it has undermined community pharmacists' view of themselves as skilled professionals. Furthermore, it has blurred the boundaries related to what it means to be a pharmacist and the role that pharmacists should play in the provision of public health care.

While offering a seemingly negative prognosis for the future of independent community pharmacy, the study offers hope in the recommendation that this sector should focus on the refinement of their clinical skills – as a means to re-assert themselves, as indispensable providers of pharmaceutical care – within the future NHI system.

The findings of this study are significant; since they allow for a better understanding of how pharmacists may internalise inherent changes – with the introduction of the new NHI. Furthermore, the study makes a major contribution to both local and international knowledge of corporatisation and community pharmacy; and this will have implications for both the practice and politics of pharmacy.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING IN AN UNDERGRADUATE B PHARM PROGRAMME: IMPACT OF AN INTERVENTION ON ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Experiential learning is increasingly recognised to be a vital component of pharmacy education; since it facilitates the integration of theory with practice; and it develops critical thinking and problem-solving skills. However, students often experience difficulties, when applying discipline-specific knowledge in experiential-learning environments. The findings of the current research, which employed an advanced mixed-methods typology, using qualitative and quantitative methodologies, describe the lived experiences of final year pharmacy students prior to and on completion of a hospital-based experiential-learning programme in a South African setting.

The detailed insight gained from the qualitative results was subsequently used to develop an intervention aimed at improving academic achievement in experiential learning. The intervention was implemented in the form of academic support sessions, by using a structured approach to analysing case-based scenarios; and it was delivered through a variety of active learning strategies.

There is a paucity of research from this perspective, both in South Africa and internationally. The study sample at Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University is representative of students enrolled for undergraduate Bachelor of Pharmacy degrees at other universities, both in South Africa and internationally. Thus, the research findings are of wider interest and relevance in the context of experiential-learning programmes in pharmacy education worldwide. In addition, the difficulties experienced with the application and integration of knowledge are not unique to pharmacy students, making the research relevant to educators involved in other experiential-learning programmes for other healthcare professionals.

A BEST PRACTICE GUIDELINE FOR FACILITATING ADHERENCE TO ANTI-RETROVIRAL THERAPY FOR PERSONS ATTENDING PUBLIC HOSPITALS IN GHANA

The retention of persons in an HIV programme is a global challenge. The available data on clients receiving anti-retroviral therapy (ART) in public hospitals in Ghana reveals that the patients do not adhere strictly to their treatment guideline, which results in ART failure. The purpose of this study was to develop a best-practice guideline for facilitating adherence to ART by persons receiving treatment at public hospitals in Ghana.

The study was organised in three phases. In Phase one, a qualitative, exploratory, descriptive and contextual design was used to establish the experiences of persons receiving ART, as well as the experiences of healthcare professionals regarding the care, support and guidance provided. In Phase two, the literature was searched using an integrative literature-review approach; and the data were critically appraised, in order to identify the best available evidence related to ART adherence.

In Phase three, a best-practice guideline for facilitating adherence to ART was developed for public hospitals in Ghana, based on the findings of Phase One and Phase Two. The guideline was submitted to an expert panel, which acknowledged this unique contribution to the body of nursing knowledge, research and practice.

BEST PRACTICE GUIDELINES FOR THE NURSING MANAGEMENT OF WOMEN WITH GESTATIONAL DIABETES MELLITUS IN MILITARY HEALTH INSTITUTIONS IN GHANA

Dr Mensah's doctoral study focused on the development of a best-practice guideline for the nursing management of women with Gestational Diabetes Mellitus (GDM) in military health institutions in Ghana. The study followed a three-phased approach; and it was inclusive of interviews with professional nurses, midwives and women with a history of GDM, an integrative literature review of available best-practice guidelines for the nursing management of GDM, as well as the development and review of the guideline by means of an expert panel.

The guideline used the Appraisal of Guidelines for Research and Evaluation II (AGREEII) format; and it included practice recommendations for screening and diagnosis, as well as the involvement and communication with women diagnosed with GDM, while considering their cultural background and socio-economic challenges. Educational recommendations for women with a history of GDM, as well as students, professional nurses and midwives were included, as were Organisational and Policy recommendations considering the availability of resources and the infrastructural layout of the health facilities.

The study has made a significant contribution to the body of Health-Science knowledge; as this guideline was the first to be developed for the military health institutions in Ghana. The guideline is expected to assist the professional nurses and those midwives managing GDM and patient outcomes.

THE MANAGEMENT OF ENDOTRACHEAL TUBE-CUFF PRESSURE IN MECHANICALLY VENTILATED ADULT PATIENTS IN INTENSIVE CARE UNITS IN MALAWI

The study entailed the implementation and evaluation of the effect of an evidence-based guideline (EBG) on the management of endotracheal tube-cuff (ETT) pressure in mechanically ventilated adult patients by nurses in Intensive Care Units (ICUs) in Malawi, using active and passive implementation strategies. The research study used a four-phase approach, in order to achieve the objectives that were set. The data collection in phase one was done by a hand-delivered pre-test questionnaire. In phase two, an expert panel reviewed the EBG that was implemented. Phase three was the implementation of the reviewed EBG, using a Randomised-Control Trial, including six ICUs; three in the intervention group using active-implementation strategies and three in the control group using passive-implementation strategies.

Phase four included a post-test questionnaire to evaluate the effectiveness of the implementation process. The results revealed a gap with regard to the recommended ETT cuff-pressure practices amongst the nurses in the study. Furthermore, training, intensive supportive supervision and critical resources were recommended for the effective implementation of EBGs in ICUs in Malawi. The study was the first of its kind in Malawi. It has made a significant contribution to the health-science body of knowledge; as the study has contributed to the awareness of the recommended practice for the management of endotracheal tube-cuff pressure in ICUs in Malawi.

STRATEGIES TO PREPARE AND SUPPORT THE ROLE TRANSITION OF SIGNIFICANT OTHERS IN BECOMING CAREGIVERS OF PERSONS WITH DEMENTIA

The study entails the development of strategies for advanced psychiatric nurses, psychiatric nurses, as well as other healthcare professionals, to prepare and support significant others who become caregivers of persons with dementia; as they transition into a caregiving role, in order for them to be well prepared and supported in their new role.

The study followed a three-phased approach, whereby visual narrative inquiry was utilized, using collages and semi-structured individual interviews to collect the data from participants, who were the caregivers of persons with dementia. A conceptual framework was used for the development of strategies, which were reviewed by both content and methodology experts. The study has made a significant contribution to the health-science body of knowledge; as it could contribute to the development of a national dementia strategy and the empowerment of caregivers of persons with dementia.

The strategies are expected to assist advanced psychiatric nurses, psychiatric nurses and other healthcare professionals, who are caring for significant others that become caregivers of persons with dementia.
